FROM THE BRINK OF COLLAPSE TO ALL-AMERICAN: THE RESURGENCE OF VFW POST 1679

Two years ago, Ventura's Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1679 faced an uncertain future. The post, once a thriving center of camaraderie and support for veterans, was on the verge of having its charter revoked. Financial struggles, administrative challenges, and dwindling membership threatened to shut its doors permanently. However, through relentless dedication and an unwavering commitment to service, the post not only survived but has emerged as a model of success, now on track to earn the prestigious All-American designation.

A FIGHT TO SAVE THE POST

The turnaround began under the leadership of then-Post Commander Paragon, now serving as Senior Vice Commander, and current Post Commander Jeremy Harman. Recognizing the dire state of the post, the two leaders embarked on a two-year journey of hard work, transparency, and cooperation. They understood that revitalization would require more than just internal restructuring—it would demand outreach, collaboration, and engagement with the broader veteran and civilian communities.

One of the most crucial elements of this transformation was the partnership with the Post Auxiliary. The Auxiliary stepped up to provide financial support and helped organize community outreach initiatives that reinforced the post's role as a central hub for veterans and their families. This alliance ensured the post had the resources to continue its mission and provide essential services to those in need.

NAVIGATING LEGAL AND FINANCIAL CHALLENGES

To address financial discrepancies and legal concerns, the leadership worked closely with multiple governmental agencies, including the Department of Justice (DOJ), the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), and the California Franchise Tax Board (FTB). Restoring compliance with these agencies was a crucial step in securing the post's future and regaining the trust of its members.

A key player in this recovery effort was the suspension committee, which included former State Commander

Marty Yingling, District Commander Larry Ramey, and District Quartermaster Wayne Wright. Their expertise and commitment provided essential guidance through the complicated process of financial reconciliation, ensuring the post met all regulatory requirements and restored its standing within the VFW community.

Former State Commander Tim Bryant also played a pivotal role in securing the post's future. His guidance and dedication led to a formal request for a stay of execution to the National Commander-in-Chief, allowing the post the necessary time to implement crucial reforms and demonstrate its commitment to recovery.

The leadership also received significant support from the VFW Department of California. Then-Senior Vice Commander Deb Johnson, who now serves as the State Commander, played a pivotal role in advising and assisting Post 1679 as it navigated these challenges. In addition to her strategic guidance, she provided essential education on the VFW Manual of Procedure and personally trained each line officer, ensuring that the post's leadership was well-equipped to operate effectively and in accordance with VFW's mission and values.

STRENGTHENING THROUGH INCLUSION AND EXPANSION

As the post reestablished itself, it also sought to expand its reach and reinforce its role as a home for all veterans. One of the most significant developments was the inclusion of American Legion Post 48 and its Auxiliary under the same roof. This integration fostered a stronger, united community of veterans, pooling resources and increasing the post's ability to serve Ventura County's veteran population effectively.

This collaboration has strengthened the post's ability to host events, offer assistance programs, and advocate for veterans' rights on a larger scale. The combined efforts of both organizations have not only enhanced the post's financial stability but have also created a more inclusive and supportive environment for veterans of all eras and branches of service.

Sal Cota

**District 6 Commander, U.S. Army
Veteran, VFW Member Since 2015**

From serving overseas in South Korea to serving fellow veterans across California, Sal Cota's path to leadership in the Veterans of Foreign Wars Department of California is grounded in gratitude, service, and community.



After 13 years of military service in the U.S. Army (2002–2015), Sal earned his VFW eligibility during a deployment in South Korea from 2007 to 2008. However, it wasn't until 2015, during a challenging period for his family, that he truly experienced the power of the VFW community. His local post in Paso Robles, VFW Post 10965, awarded him a grant that helped his family avoid eviction. "That was the moment that changed everything for me," Sal recalls. "I knew I had to give back to the organization that gave me hope."

From that point forward, Sal leaned into service. He started as Junior Vice Commander of his post, quickly rising to Commander — a role he held for six to seven years. Quartermaster Milton Black became both a mentor and father figure to Sal, encouraging him to attend district meetings where he met then-District Commander Deb Johnson (now the Department Commander), whose mentorship further solidified Sal's path. "I wasn't there for recognition — I did the work because it was the right thing to do," he says.

As District 6 Commander, Sal's mission was clear: to make the department commander's home district shine. Through shared resources, mutual support, and a collective commitment to excellence, District 6





earned All-State and All-American honors under his leadership. One highlight was a donation that allowed Post 10965 in Maricopa to secure life memberships for all non-life-member officers in the district — a true testament to VFW comradeship.

At the post level, Sal continues to innovate and inspire. His post's "Taco Takeover" events — monthly gatherings in partnership with veteran-owned and veteran-friendly businesses — have become a major draw for community engagement and new membership. "We're nearly at 200% membership," he says proudly. "Our goal is to be number one in our division for the remainder of this year."

Looking ahead, Sal remains committed to strengthening the organization. "I'll always support District 6 and serve as a source of innovation," he says. "To the next district commander, I'd offer the same advice that was given to me: you don't have to do it alone. Lean on your team, your post, and your mentors. That's how we succeed together."

Above all, Sal is driven by a deep commitment to the VFW's future and a strong support system at home. "None of this would've been possible without my wife, Priscilla and our four boys — Emilio, Lucas, Salvador, and Lorenzo. I hope people see me as part of the future of the VFW in California, because I'm just getting started."

As a Vietnam veteran, Mark is deeply aware of the value of camaraderie and has benefitted first-hand from finding his community within the VFW. His legacy of service has evolved over the years to allow him to give back to others and make a difference in the lives of those around him.

EXPANDING POW/MIA RECOGNITION EFFORTS

In his role as the POW/MIA Committee Chairman, Mark has focused on expanding efforts to raise awareness for POW/MIA servicemembers both inside and outside of the Veteran community. His goal is simple, “to connect with POW/MIA and their families and ensure that these men and women know they will never be forgotten.”

The VFWCA holds an annual POW/MIA recognition event, led by the POW/MIA Committee. The 2024 event was held in northern California for the first time, at Mark’s behest. He hoped to reach a broader audience with the event and believed switching up the location was the way to do it. The POW/MIA Committee is currently exploring central California locations for the 2025 event to create a tradition of bringing Californians from across the state together in honor of POW/MIA servicemembers and their families.





A LIFETIME OF SERVICE

Prior to joining the VFW, Mark spent 25 years as a volunteer youth sports coach. After stepping back from that role, he was in search of a new way to get involved in his community. He caught the attention of a VFW table while wearing his Vietnam Veteran hat at the Cajun Catfish Festival in Conroe, Texas. They encouraged him to join the organization, renewing his dedication to service. He soon transferred to Post 1525 in California and upgraded to a life membership in 2014. This was just the beginning.

Mark served as the Commander for Post 1525 for seven years, as the Quartermaster for three years, as the District 10 commander for four years. His Post received All-State recognition for all seven years he served as Post Commander, and received All-American recognition for five of those years. He has personally recruited over 100 new members to the VFW and remains active at the Post level.

STEPPING FORWARD, NOT STEPPING DOWN

#StillServing can look different for everyone. For Mark, it means being involved in any way he can. Either as a leader, or a mentor. After years of major leadership roles, Mark now he says he is looking forward to passing the reins. He will continue serving on various committees but has encouraged others to step into leadership roles at the Post and District levels. He is excited for the future of the organization and has been supporting the involvement of younger members. He said, “the future of the VFW is the younger Post members. But it is up to us, the older ones, to mentor them without telling them how it’s done, because they are going to have new ideas.”

No matter when or where they served, VFW members support each other. Mark is prioritizing connecting with younger Veterans and has seen increased membership among Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans, along with other recent conflicts. While their experiences may have been different, they all have one thing in common: a commitment to serving. “We want these younger Veterans to know that we have been where they are,” he said. “We have fought hard for the benefits we have, and we are going to keep fighting for their benefits too.”

HOW TO CONVINCE SOMEONE TO GET HELP FOR THEIR MENTAL HEALTH

There are many reasons why some people are reluctant to get help for their mental health or addiction issues.

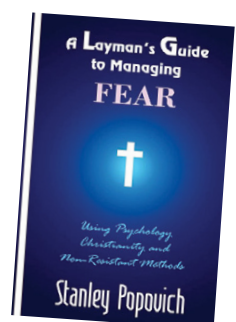
In addition, many people are not sure what to do when encouraging someone to get the help they need for their mental health.

As a result, here are seven suggestions on how to convince a person struggling to get some assistance.

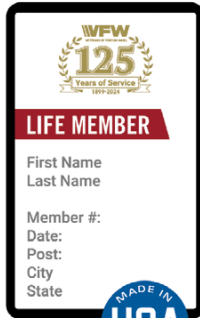
1. **Talk to the person instead of talking at them:** Nobody wants to be lectured or yelled at. The person who is struggling is scared and they need help in overcoming their fears and resistance to getting some guidance. Treat others the way you would want to be treated if the roles were reversed.
2. **Find out why the person won't get help:** Ask the individual who is struggling the reasons why they are reluctant to get some assistance. Although most people may not admit it, a sense of fear of the unknown and/or some kind of frustration are usually the main factors. It might take a few tries, however, try to find out what is stopping your friend from getting treatment.
3. **Address the reasons why the individual won't get help:** Once you get the reasons why he or she won't get some help, the next step is to find the ways to address those factors that are preventing the individual from getting assistance. Addressing one's fears and concerns may convince them to take some action that will get their life back on track.
4. **Get some advice from a professional:** Talk to your doctor or a mental health counselor for recommendations on how you can help someone who is struggling. A medical professional in the mental health field will be able to give you some ideas and options that you can use to help convince someone you know to get some help.
5. **Find someone who understands:** Try to find someone who used to struggle with their mental health for their advice. For example, a person who used drugs and alcohol in the past could use their past experiences and insights to convince the individual to seek treatment. A person who used to struggle with addiction or their mental health may be better able to relate to the person who is struggling.
6. **Get them to attend a support group:** Another way to convince someone to get help is to get them to go to a mental health support group. This may or may not work depending on the individual, but it is still worth a try. A person who goes to a support group can at least listen to those who are also struggling, which may convince the person to get some assistance.
7. **Be persistent:** Continue to be persistent with your loved ones in getting them the help they need. Keep in contact with your doctor and any mental health counselor on your progress. If things do not improve, continue to find other alternatives in getting the person some help.

CARL'S JR. "STARS FOR HEROES" PROGRAM DELIVERS FOR LOCAL VFW POSTS



For over two decades, Carl's Jr. has quietly pursued a mission close to its heart—supporting veterans through its annual Stars for Heroes campaign. 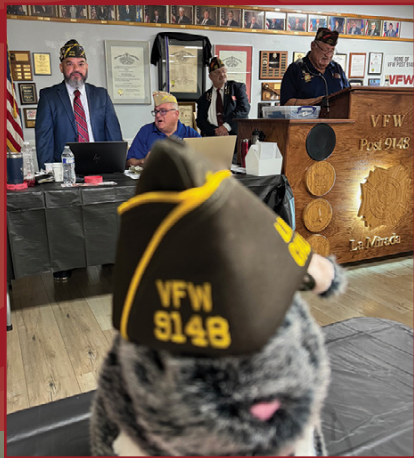

THE RISE OF “DE-INFLUENCING” AND “AUTHENTIC” CONTENT

The evolution of social media in recent years has created the “Influencer”, with carefully curated and polished content designed to give off a specific aesthetic. Influencers could be found in various communities, interests and fields. They were aptly named, because their goal was to influence users in some way, including selling products, lifestyles, or belief systems. As our social media habits continue to change and grow, we are entering an era where many users are shifting away from blindly trusting these influencers. Instead, authentic content is on the rise.

WHAT IS AUTHENTIC CONTENT?

Authentic content is pictures, videos, captions, or any other aspect of a social media page that are developed to be genuine, instead of perfect.

HOW TO DO AUTHENTIC CONTENT FOR YOUR POST?

To maintain an “authentic” page, Posts can regularly share content as it happens, instead of waiting until weeks later. Sometimes there is a pressure to craft the perfect caption or gather as many photos as possible before sharing about an event. But current trends promote the idea of sharing as you go, with photos of real members and attendees at events.

ARE THERE DRAWBACKS?

One of the biggest drawbacks of “authentic content” is trying to find the balance between looking real and looking disorganized. Make sure the content you are sharing is representative of your Post and the VFW, and genuine in nature.

OUR RECOMMENDATION

Share photos and videos on your Facebook and Instagram story as you go. And then in the days after an event, gather those photos and videos and create a full event recap post.
